



**CITY COUNCIL STUDY SESSION
TUESDAY, JANUARY 17, 2023**

Meeting Minutes

1) CALL TO ORDER / ROLL CALL

Deputy Mayor Quitslund called the meeting to order at 6:01 p.m. in Council Chambers and on the Zoom webinar platform.

Deputy Mayor Quitslund, Mayor Fantroy-Johnson, and Councilmembers Deets, Hytopoulos, Moriwaki, and Schneider were present. Councilmember Pollock was absent and excused.

Councilmember Deets moved and Councilmember Moriwaki seconded to approve the agenda as presented.

The motion carried unanimously, 6 – 0.

Stephan Goldby, President and CEO of the Bainbridge Island Chamber of Commerce, Joe Raymond, General Manager at Pleasant Beach Village, and Lisa Alfieri, Commuter Comforts, shared their experiences on the implementation of the Waste Reduction Regulations, and Council discussed the topic.
